Laura Adzanku

Respected community leader and advocate for women and multiculturalism

In the 16 years that Laura has been in Australia, she has quickly established a leading role in the African community, becoming a respected leader, role model and advocate for multiculturalism.

Following her own settlement, Laura's passion for working with culturally and linguistically diverse communities was ignited through her work as a settlement officer with the African Communities Council of SA. She has been supporting various migrant communities in volunteer and paid roles since this time.

Laura has sought to address the prevalent issues within these communities through community consultations, education and the successful implementation of a wide range of programs. These include delivering cultural competency workshops, programs that engage in the arts and cultural heritage, music and dance programs for young people and women's empowerment by promoting independence and leadership for African women.

She has also conducted community programs on health and financial issues within CALD communities and her knowledge remains a valuable asset to the services sector.

Laura's commitment to her community is evident through her work as volunteer coordinator for the African Festival and Public Officer for the Federation of African Women Federation in South Australia.

Laura's achievements include supporting and launching the Liberian Men's Association of SA (LIMSA) and the Sierra Leonean Men's Club of SA (KABUDU), which has helped men from these communities become role models promoting healthy forms of masculinity to end violence against women.

Laura now uses her extensive knowledge and experience in her work as a Family Dispute Resolution Officer and continues to serve her community as a member of the South Australian Multicultural and Ethnic Affairs Commission.

Barbara Baird

LGBTIQ activist and advocate for abortion law reform

A well-known and respected academic, Barbara has influenced countless lives through her teaching, mentoring, research, academic and community group involvement and advocacy. She has worked tirelessly to change attitudes, reform laws, and pioneer change, particularly as a long term campaigner for abortion law reform and advocate for the LGBTIQ community.

Barbara is Associate Professor of Women's Studies at Flinders University. During her career she has been a pioneer of sexuality studies, becoming a recognised international expert on the history of abortion and the politics of equality, especially in relation to the LGBTIQ communities.

Through her academic work and community commitments Barbara has addressed racial, gendered and sexual inequality, improving relationships between diverse community groups and promoting understanding of feminist and indigenous issues as they impact on the social and political lives of Australians.

Her dedication to social justice saw her introduce the Indigenous Women's Voices course, focusing on the intellectual and creative work of Indigenous women, for which she received a Faculty Teaching Award in 2013.

Since 2015 she has co-convened the SA Abortion Action Coalition, working to improve women's access to abortions and advocate for its decriminalisation.

She regularly participates on panels promoting recognition of LGBTIQ issues and works with numerous volunteer organisations to promote understanding and improve community relations. To pay tribute to former Premier Don Dunstan and commemorate the 40 year anniversary of the decriminalisation of homosexuality in SA, Barbara co-instigated the 'Marching Dunstan's' contingent of 125 marchers in the Pride March.

Mary Barton

Supporting the widows and families of veterans

A former teacher, Mary is a legatee and volunteer for Legacy, a charity that provides services to families after the injury or death of a spouse or parent during or after their defence force service.

Mary has dedicated herself to supporting ageing and vulnerable widows and the young families of recently returned servicemen. From helping others understand their entitlements and complete necessary paperwork, to paying home visits, or taking people to appointments, Mary readily offers assistance and guidance.

The families Mary has supported include those who have returned from recent conflicts such as Afghanistan. Her understanding and advice have assisted many families to navigate and access programs and services that offer practical assistance and relief.

A member of the South Australian Branch of Partners of Veterans Association, a network of partners helping partners, she brings her knowledge of a range of health and welfare issues to the work she does.

Mary also finds the time to volunteer at fundraising events such as Legacy badge days and sausage sizzles, raising awareness and much needed funds to enable the care of the families of veterans who've given their lives or their health.

Mary is actively involved and a respected member of the lifestyle village community in which she lives and is always on hand to help anyone in need.

She inspires others with her generosity and commitment to caring for others in the community.

Susan 'Grace' Benny (1872-1944)

Australia's first woman member of local government

On 22 December 1919 Susan 'Grace' Benny was appointed by the state government to represent the newly created Seacliff Ward on the Brighton Council (now in the City of Holdfast Bay), becoming the first woman in Australia elected as a councillor for local government. During her three terms she successfully argued for improved access to the beach, including the abolishment of segregated 'sea-bathing', the installation of electric lights and the allocation of reserves for a children's playground and public garden.

Active in a range of community and political organisations, Grace, as she was known, was Honorary Secretary of the Seacliff Cheer-up Society, a member of the local progress association, spinning and croquet clubs. As president of the Women's Branch of the South Australian Liberal Union, in 1918 she was instrumental in bringing about an amendment to the legislation that gave equality of divorce for women. As a Justice of the Peace she heard cases relating to state children, police matters and women.

Her contribution to local government has been recognised through the naming of Benny Crescent and Susan Grace Benny Reserve, a bronze plaque on North Terrace and a bronze statue outside the Brighton Library. The Grace Benny Scholarship, awarded annually by the Australian Local Government Women's Association (South Australian Branch), celebrates her 'pioneering spirit' by awarding two women elected members a scholarship to be put towards an activity that will enhance their skills as an elected member.

Eva Bezak

A quiet achiever in a male dominated field

Professor Eva Bezak is a leader, educator and highly accomplished researcher in radiation physics. Her infectious enthusiasm inspires students and colleagues alike. A role model for women in STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics), she is equally as passionate for all who achieve around her as she is for her own achievements.

While Eva is deeply engaged in her research, she is keen to enlist and nurture the brightest and best students to join the quest to understand more about cancer and deliver new treatments.

Eva has an enviable academic record, having authored and co-authored over 120 papers, made 200 conference presentations and co-authored many books on radiotherapy physics, radiation biology and novel therapies. She is actively involved in several development projects and organising committees, including the development of national and state cancer plans for radiation oncology.

Before being appointed a Professor at the University of South Australia in 2015, Eva was a Chief Physicist at the Royal Adelaide Hospital, responsible for services provision to radiation oncology in the state.

She is an active member of the medical physics professional community in Australia and internationally and was recently a member of the Australian Academy of Science working party developing a position paper on the Future of Accelerators in Australia. In June 2015 she was elected to the Administrative Council of the International Union of Physical and Engineering Sciences in Medicine and appointed to chair the Women in Physics and Biomedical Engineering Task Group.

Jenni Caruso

Passionate advocate and educator

Dr Jenni Caruso is an Eastern Arrernte woman and survivor of the Stolen Generations. She is a passionate advocate and educator, with a strong sense of community and responsibility to righting continuing practices that disadvantage Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Jenni's recently completed PhD at the University of Adelaide was a personal reflection on being taken from her family and used historical investigation and analysis to explore the race-based policies behind the removals.

Jenni is driven by a strong sense of social justice for all and uses her knowledge of Aboriginal history to ensure that those writing about and working with Aboriginal people, in and outside of academia, are well informed and ethically sensitive.

Through her teaching and as Director of the Gender, Equity and Diversity Committee, Faculty of Arts at the University, Jenni ensures that a culturally and intellectually safe learning and teaching environment is created for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and that pedagogical approaches enable students to complete their studies.

In working with staff at the University, she highlights the ways in which colonisation continues to inform academic approaches to writing and the needs of students, who are often 'first in family' to study at the higher education level and impacted by the levels of socio-economic and political disadvantage.

An activist and advocate, Jenni is a member of the South Australian Stolen Generations Aboriginal Corporation. She is now working on the Family, Memory and Identity amongst the Stolen Generations project, to collect and disseminate the stories of members of the Stolen Generations in the Murraylands, as part of the process of reparation.

Alice Dixon

(1939-1992)

Devoted advocate for human rights and Aboriginal people

Alice was a proud Kaurna and Narungga woman from South Australia, who gained a national and international reputation for highlighting injustices faced by Aboriginal people, especially Aboriginal Deaths in Custody.

Alice was a devoted mother raising six children and foster mother to many children removed from their families.

In the 1970's, Alice was involved in many foundational programs and established, with others, the Aboriginal Coordinating Committee, an outreach health centre located at Alberton. She supported the Central Missions Sunday Club (Wesley United), Centre for Aboriginal Studies in Music (CASM), and the Aboriginal Centre in Wakefield Street, Adelaide during this period.

When her teenage son died in custody in 1987, Alice lobbied the government for a Royal Commission to investigate Aboriginal deaths in custody and established the SA Aboriginal Deaths in Custody Watch Committee. She went on to join the Committee to Defend Black Rights, becoming an executive member in 1989.

Alice represented her community at a local, national and international level, attending conferences, universities, organisations and rallies to publicise Aboriginal deaths in custody and other injustices and social conditions impacting her people.

To assist her in monitoring human rights issues on the international stage, she undertook diplomacy training at the University of New South Wales.

Alice is remembered as courageous and motivated by the love for her people and humankind. She was passionate about unity and worked with all sectors, including prisons, police and authorities, to raise awareness and to bring about meaningful change.

Jennifer Duncan

Passionate advocate for social change

Recognised for her values-based leadership and for creating sustainable initiatives that give back to South Australia, Jennifer has been committed to advancing progressive social issues for many years.

Early in her career, she coordinated the University of South Australia's annual Reconciliation Forum, resulting in the University's Reconciliation Commitment Statement. Following comprehensive consultation with Aboriginal leaders within and outside of the university, she went on to implement that university's first Indigenous Employment Scheme.

Jennifer has dedicated herself to working in not-for-profit organisations. As Deputy Director at the SA Council of Social Service, she developed the Blueprint for the Elimination of Poverty, which became a key advocacy tool, showing causes and consequences of disadvantage in the State and providing clear and targeted strategies for moving people out of poverty.

She collaborated with service organisations, economists, the Australian Council of Social Services (ACOSS) network and union representatives, to successfully secure vital pay rises of up to 41% for underpaid community service workers through the ACOSS Equal Pay Campaign.

While Director of the Youth Affairs Council of SA, she advocated for the rights of young people and promoted young people's representation in the organisation's governance and policy-making structures. She also consistently and tirelessly advocated for justice reinvestment as a vehicle for redirecting investment in prisons towards crime prevention, in her role as Deputy Chair with Justice Reinvestment SA.

More recently, after five years successfully building not-for-profit Time for Kids, Jennifer led the organisation into a strategic merger, before moving on to work as a consultant with various small to medium enterprises and not-for-profits.

Jennifer also volunteers for organisations working with vulnerable and disadvantaged communities by serving on their boards.

Emmah Evans

Advocate for Cystic Fibrosis

Emmah is a lifelong campaigner and advocate for people living with Cystic Fibrosis, the most common life-threatening, hereditary illness affecting the lungs and digestive system.

As an ambassador for Cure4 Cystic Fibrosis, Emmah courageously shares the highs and the lows of her own journey with over 4,000 followers on Facebook and 5,000 on Instagram, to help support others. She is also a National Youth Ambassador for Cystic Fibrosis Australia.

In addition to her role tackling the stigma surrounding Cystic Fibrosis, Emmah is an accomplished author, motivational speaker, wife and mother.

Emmah has worked tirelessly to raise awareness and funds for Cystic Fibrosis research at the local, national and international level, by hosting events and speaking in front of audiences.

She has received many honours, including the 2019 Australia Day Council of SA Women Hold Up Half the Sky award and was featured in the Cystic Fibrosis Warrior Project: 65 stories of triumph against Cystic Fibrosis.

A courageous and empowering leader, Emmah is passionate about raising awareness and spreading hope to people from all walks of life.

Jen Frith

A leader in Adelaide's youth arts community

Jen has been creating belonging, acceptance and community for young people through youth arts over many years.

She co-founded Chalk, an Adelaide based music and arts group that addresses issues important to kids through performance, in 1998. Chalk has since toured primary schools throughout SA, Tasmania, Victoria, ACT, NSW and WA and has performed over 1000 shows to over 300,000 kids.

In 2004, she co-founded Pelican Productions, an inclusive arts program for young people of all ages and abilities, who want to participate in quality performing arts experiences. Pelican Productions has been nominated for several awards, including the Children's Week Award for outstanding service to children and the Adelaide Theatre Guide Awards for outstanding theatre.

In the following year, Jen began the highly successful Music Theatre Camp, which continues to be held annually in January during school holidays. The camp has grown from 64 to over 500 participants between the ages of 8 to 19.

She was recognised as a Winnovation Award Finalist in 2018 for her 2-week music theatre camp 'Belonging', which looked at the fundamental need of belonging.

Jen continues to develop innovative creative projects. These include Hatch, stories and creations of young people exploring complex themes, transcending political discourse and promoting deep engagement and thought and Songs of Home, which is uniting Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and migrant communities through songs, stories and home language.

Her inclusive way of working builds community and ensures that every child is celebrated for who they are and know it is safe to be themselves.

Phuong-Ngon Ha April Hoffmann

A devoted volunteer with the Vietnamese community

Phuong has been an active and dedicated volunteer in the Indochinese Association of South Australia for over 20 years.

Over the years, community members have relied on Phuong for a hearty meal of Beef Noodle Soup, her speciality, served at the community hall with a warm smile.

She is the principal co-ordinator of social and recreational activities for the elderly, ethnic groups and the unemployed in the northern and southern suburbs and has led countless classes and excursions to help members engage with the wider community and to bring people together to socialise and connect with each other.

A strong leader, Phuong motivates other volunteers and is involved in a number of community fundraising events, including leading a group that cooks and serves community meals on weekends.

A respected member of the Vietnamese community, Phuong is well known for her friendliness, selfless and generous nature and for providing ongoing personal support to the disadvantaged, those who are unwell and the vulnerable.

Community volunteer and leader in the Nuriootpa community

April has supported her local community as a volunteer and fundraiser for the past 15 years.

She has been actively involved at her children's school, sports club and in her church in numerous roles and through a range of activities.

As a volunteer Emergency Relief Worker with Lutheran Community Care, April has helped support disadvantaged people in the Barossa area and beyond.

A strong leader, April organised her local school's annual Grand Friends' Day fundraiser, which attracted more than 1000 people, and other fundraisers including the Barossa area fundraisers for cancer at the Nuriootpa Hockey Club.

A dedicated volunteer, April is a pivotal worker in her church, organising Australia Day breakfasts, Sunday school activities and fundraising events.

She is known for her commitment to her community, boundless generosity, compassion and caring nature and is regarded in the community as an inspiring role model.

Jennifer Howard

A champion of Domestic Violence Survivors and their pets

Founder and CEO of Safe Pets Safe Families, Jennifer has courageously used her own devastating personal experience of domestic violence to provide an emergency service for people who are facing disadvantage and crisis situations, predominantly domestic violence, and their pets.

The fostering service removes the barrier to someone leaving a dangerous situation with their pets, by referring them to appropriate services and helping take care of their animals while they seek help and re-establish themselves.

Jennifer spent her 20s in a cycle of domestic violence and when she gained the courage to leave, was forced to take refuge in a domestic violence shelter that did not take pets. Sadly, she never saw her pets again.

The pain and injustice she felt never left her and the belief that her personal tragedy could have been averted if she had been able to find appropriate housing when she needed it, inspired her to help others in the same situation.

Jennifer works tirelessly to support as many people as possible. Her passion, dedication and formidable work ethic have seen Safe Pets Safe Families grow from a desire to help, to an organisation of three hundred volunteers around the State.

Through her work, Jennifer has helped raise awareness about the link between animal abuse and domestic and family violence and provided much needed support to vulnerable people in difficult times.

Viv Maher

(1948 - 2017)

A champion of social justice

A respected Aboriginal elder and social worker for over 40 years, Viv worked primarily in regional South Australia and was a staunch advocate and mentor for women, young professionals and Indigenous people.

Viv was born in the Victorian town of Warragul and pursued a career in social work when she finished high school, studying commerce and social work at university.

In 1980 Viv began working in the South East Women's Emergency Shelter and went on to become the Director of the shelter in 1989. She used this role to develop a more professional and sustainable model of support for women and children fleeing domestic violence. She was committed to real engagement with Aboriginal communities and employed Aboriginal women as support workers. During this time, she also worked to raise awareness of AIDS and reduce the significant stigma associated with the disease at the time.

She worked for many years in agencies including Centrelink, CAMHS and Education, where she focused on mental health services, and as an advocate for children in family law mediation at Centacare.

In 2016 Viv became the first South Australian, and first Aboriginal Life Member of the Australian Association of Social Workers.

As a tutor at the Mount Gambier campus of the University of South Australia, Viv paved the way for students to get placements in non-traditional social work roles, such as at the Forestry Union to promote education around domestic violence.

A champion of social justice, a strong feminist and fierce advocate, she is remembered for her dedication, passion and practice of social work principles and her commitment to equality.

Sadly, Viv died of pancreatic cancer shortly before her 69th birthday and is still missed by the local community.

Leah Marrone

A champion of social justice

Leah has spent her legal career championing gender equality and advocating against discrimination and has worked for the advancement of women for more than 18 years as a dedicated volunteer.

In addition to working full time at the Legal Services Commission, Leah has volunteered for numerous community organisations, including community legal centres and the Refugee Advocacy Service of SA.

As Deputy Chair and Board member of Welcome to Australia, a refugee advocacy charity, Leah has been recognised by the Governor of SA with a lifetime membership award in acknowledgement of her extensive volunteering for the organisation.

In her role as Vice President and SA Director of Australian Women Lawyers, Leah wrote extensively on the topic of sexual harassment and convened a national policy forum of women lawyers focussing on strategies for change. As the immediate past President of the Women Lawyers' Association of SA, she helped to launch, market, and support the Find a Female Lawyer Service.

Through her involvement in the Women Lawyers Association and the Women Lawyers Committee of the Law Society of SA, Leah has been a fierce advocate for establishing mother and infant facilities in the women's prison, and the decriminalisation of sex work and abortion.

She has also championed a national project on addressing sexual harassment in the legal profession, as a committee member of the Law Council of Australia's Equal Opportunity Committee.

A strong advocate of equality for women in the legal profession and more broadly, Leah was recognised in 2018 by the Law Society of South Australia with a Gender Equity in Law Award.

Marion McCall OAM

Internationally recognised Award-winning aviator

Marion was born in Mornington, Victoria and wanted to be an 'opera diva', but it was while living in rural South Australia that she developed an interest in flying. She learnt to fly at the age of 49 to pilot her husband David, an Anglican Bishop, around the far-flung centres of his diocese of Willochra in northern and western South Australia, in a small Cessna.

In 2005 Marion became the first Australian winner of the Ultimate Challenge, a prestigious international flying competition. She has received several awards for her service to aviation, including winning the Duke of Edinburgh's Dawn-to-Dusk International Flying Competition four times – the only Australian woman to do so. In 2009, Marion's skills as an aviator were further recognised when she received the Nancy Bird Trophy for most noteworthy contribution to aviation by a woman in Australasia.

In 2011 she was awarded the Order of Australia Medal for her services to the Australian Women's Pilots Association, which has a Scholarship in her name to financially assist Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women to train as pilots.

Marion has published several books of poetry and short stories and was President of Australian Church Women from 2012 to 2014. She continues to be involved in Anglican Church activities, particularly through the Mothers Union.

Robyn Norman

A dedicated volunteer in the Naracoorte community

A hard-working, natural leader, Robyn is known in her community for always doing something for others.

She has demonstrated leadership and service through a range of activities and as a dedicated volunteer, has made a significant contribution to the lives of local residents.

Robyn has worked tirelessly to raise funds for the Naracoorte community for more than 30 years. She is recognised as the driving force behind any fundraiser but is always quick to compliment her band of helpers.

In recent years, Robyn established Friends with Benefits to raise funds for local people with needs and local institutions. Friends with Benefits has raised over \$100,000 for the community and helped fund the purchase of a CT machine for the Naracoorte Hospital and funds for Ronald McDonald House.

Robyn has also made Naracoorte a safer community for residents by campaigning to have the speed limit on the highway leading into the town reduced.

She is a valued part of the Naracoorte community.

Louise Pascale

Campaigner for gender equality, women's safety and mental health awareness

Louise has been a long-time campaigner for gender equality, women's safety and mental health awareness.

She is passionate about ensuring that people with mental illness live well in the community and strives to reduce the stigma surrounding mental health through her work on awareness raising campaigns.

As a member of the DV Crisis Line (now part of Women's Safety Services SA) Board, Louise has also helped develop a model for women to receive mental health support while in emergency accommodation.

A respected journalist and media consultant, Louise co-founded Outspoken Women, a social movement that seeks to empower more women to amplify their impact and influence in the workplace. She initiated and runs the Outspoken Women's scholarship program, that supports women from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds, of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander descent, survivors of domestic violence and marginalised women.

Louise was also part of the founding committee in South Australia for Women in Media, a volunteer networking and mentoring organisation which promotes and supports women in the sector and advocates for diversity.

In 2018, she founded Pascale Media, which specialises in supporting clients who are working with social issues and/or ethical products.

Through her tireless work, Louise has made a valuable contribution to our community by creating safe places and empowering pathways.

Eman Rahim

Committed to feeding people in need

Eman is the CEO and founder of Heart and Soul, a volunteer-based food relief group.

The not-for-profit organisation feeds around 2600 individuals and families in need across Adelaide through free weekly food markets in Hackham West, Christie Downs, Elizabeth and Two Wells. Food that would otherwise be dumped as landfill is donated by supermarkets, farmers, commercial wholesalers, markets, and caterers.

In the three years since its establishment, Heart and Soul has redistributed over 7 tonnes of food and Eman has volunteered more than 50 hours each week.

Eman was motivated to establish the group following her own experience of being hungry and desperate as a single mother fleeing an arranged marriage and domestic violence.

Wanting to help others in the same situation and in need, Eman began making sandwiches with her children and taking them to Whitmore Square every Sunday morning to feed the homeless. When a homeless man told her that he never received fruit, Eman and others began brainstorming how they could do more.

Under Eman's leadership, what started as a small act of kindness has grown into an organisation supported by volunteers, with the vision to ensure that food is not wasted, and no one goes hungry.

Deb Rainieri

Passionate crusader for women experiencing homelessness

Deb has dedicated the past 27 years to working with women who are experiencing homelessness or are in need of emergency accommodation, at Catherine House.

She is motivated by a strong sense of social justice and the belief that transformation is possible for anyone who is provided with the right opportunities and support.

Deb's passion and dedication stem from her own personal experience. Catherine House gave her the support she needed at a difficult time and her stay there led to her being offered a part-time position as a community service worker. Deb went on to work full time and gain formal qualifications to be of further assistance.

Following completion of a course in 2003, she approached the CEO with a proposal to deliver a weekly activity in her own time and with her own finances. Due to the success of the group Deb was given a budget and the group became embedded in the model of the service, sparking larger conversations about how further education and learning opportunities could be provided.

The program's success led to the building of a women's centre, and development of the award-winning Education and Employment Program, offering music and art as non-accredited adult community education courses and two accredited education courses focussed on career planning and workforce skills.

Deb's tireless work and passion for providing women with opportunities for self-development positively impacts the community, directly and indirectly. She has helped change the life trajectory of countless women, giving them a way to give back to their children, families and the community.

Ayesha Fariha Safdar

A Champion for Multiculturalism and Pakistani women

In 2010, Ayesha established the Adelaide Pakistani Women Association (APWA), the first association for Pakistani women in Australia, to enhance the quality of life for Pakistani women living in Adelaide.

The Association works to empower Pakistani women to engage with their community, improve health and social wellbeing, develop skills and knowledge, promote leadership aspirations and become financially independent within their communities.

Ayesha assists community members to develop personally and promotes small businesses run by Pakistani women as part of her voluntary work with the Association. She has been instrumental in building social networks and organises a range of social and religious events including cooking demonstrations, and those showcasing Pakistani music and cinema.

To recognise the achievements of women within her community, Ayesha established a leadership award in 2018 through the Association and holds regular acknowledgement ceremonies recognising the myriad of ways in which they contribute to the community.

To empower and encourage women from Pakistani backgrounds to participate at a community level, Ayesha established the Ms Adelaide SA Leadership Pageant in 2018.

In addition to running APWA on a voluntary basis, Ayesha works full time teaching English as a second language at TAFE and raising her two children.

Ayesha is a powerful role model with a strong commitment to her community and to building bridges between the Pakistani and other multicultural communities including India and Afghanistan.

Katie Sarah

Adventurer and first woman to join the "Seven-Seven" club

While working in finance and accounting and raising three sons, Katie first became a triathlete and a marathon runner. Her love of outdoor pursuits saw her take a role in adventure travel with DCXP Mountain Journeys, which ultimately led to her becoming an altitude climber.

In 2018, Katie joined the exclusive "Seven-Seven" club, becoming the only woman in the world to successfully summit the highest mountain and the highest volcanic mountain on each of the seven continents. Not one to rest on her laurels, she has skied the last degree to the South Pole and plans on reaching the North Pole in April 2020, as well as continuing high altitude climbing on lesser known peaks, purely for the love of it.

With infectious enthusiasm Katie takes great joy in sharing her passion for adventure with the community. She believes that the spirit of adventure should be a part of everyday life, that everyone should strive for their own 'personal Everest'.

Katie sits on several boards, is a Patron of Nature Play SA and an advocate for Catherine House. She is also a passionate supporter of medical research and volunteers for the Leukaemia Foundation.

Iris Strobl

A passionate leader dedicated to serving the German community

Iris migrated to Australia in 2001 and has been actively involved as a volunteer in the South Australian German Association over the past 18 years.

In 2018, whilst the German Club was experiencing significant financial hardship, Iris was appointed in the voluntary position of Club President. Her motivation to ensuring the German Club's history was not forgotten and its legacy not lost, and her strong leadership, has brought about significant reforms and secured a promising future for the club.

During her time as Club President, Iris organised a highly successful Oktoberfest for older members at the Club, in an evening of German food, drink and cultural performances.

Iris has also served as events coordinator and teacher at the SA School of German Languages.

In these roles, she has organised numerous events including three of the annual St Martin's Lantern Parade events for up to 160 children and parents. She also arranged and cooked for aged and children's club members at monthly Sunday afternoon gatherings offering German films and other cultural events.

Iris is a courageous and dedicated volunteer who has proudly served her community.

Amanda Tsoundarou (1974-2019)

Social justice advocate and champion of the disadvantaged

Amanda spent her life fighting against injustice and helping those experiencing serious disadvantage. Her important work included time as an Outreach Case Worker for the Welfare Rights Centre (SA); Coordinator for the Centre's Legal Housing Clinic, and Principal Solicitor and Manager for the Centre.

Amanda travelled regularly to regional areas, including the APY Lands, to facilitate clinics providing pro bono legal advice to homeless people and those at risk of becoming homeless in remote and rural areas in South Australia.

She received a Law Society of SA Justice Award in 2015 for her outstanding compassionate approach and work providing legal education and access to justice for those living in remote and communities throughout the State.

Amanda was also a member of the National Forum of Homeless Persons' Legal Clinics, campaigning to improve human rights and access to justice for homeless people within Australia.

To further her work in assisting vulnerable people to navigate the complexities of government agencies, systems and processes and prevent further injustice for already-disadvantaged people, Amanda took a new role as an Early Resolution Officer with the Commonwealth Ombudsman in January 2019.

Amanda was diagnosed with ovarian cancer in early 2017 and worked hard to spread awareness about this disease and raise funds for organisations focused on ovarian cancer research and support services.

Even in death Amanda continued to fight for others. Before her passing she asked that in lieu of floral tributes, donations be made to the OC Challenge South Australia in support of women fighting ovarian cancer. Over \$3,500 was donated in her name for this cause.

Carly Zanini

Advocate for equality in the construction industry

Carly works tirelessly to improve the construction industry and is passionate about encouraging diversity throughout what is still a heavily male dominated industry.

With 'get involved' as her motto, she has seen firsthand the opportunities that can present themselves when you give things a go. Equally, she also likes to give back and is a volunteer on seven different industry committees and boards, mentors university students and young professionals, and is an active member of many other industry bodies.

Carly believes that diversity, collaboration and creativity are all essential to the future success of the industry. Her commitment to women and construction has been recognised through several awards including international recognition as the Woman of the Week by the Top 100 Women, a global initiative creating awareness for women in the construction and development industry.

Carly is passionate about encouraging students to find out more about the pathways they can take to a career in construction and was recently featured in SALIFE magazine discussing her vision to build a future for women within the construction industry.
