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INTRODUCTION

TO THE WORK OF WOMEN, HONOUR IS SELDOM PAID. Of all the meanings of the word 'honour' the most appropriate for these purposes is 'to pay respect'. This we do, in the Roll of Honour for South Australian Women in the 20th Century.

We are indebted to all those who sent us lists of women whose work they consider needs to be acknowledged, not lost and forgotten as so many have been. Women's struggle against overwhelming circumstances, keeping their families and their communities whole, sensible and viable may be acknowledged in families, in some groups and in isolated instances. But the huge spread of their contribution to the life of a State or Nation is yet to be understood as the very weft and warp of the social fabric. When the weaving of the social fabric begins to break down, then we know that women's role and status is in dire trouble.

Hence, we set out to demonstrate how it was done in the past, by all these wonderful women, and include some examples of younger women who today put their new weaving of that social textual fabric to the test for this next century. We older ones can but join in for the years we have left, and wish them well in their still very exacting struggles to make patterns that make sense and light the imagination of future generations.

Some will be dismayed that we have omitted this or that very important or crucial person's name. We agree this may have happened; we publish the lists herein in good faith, as they have been submitted. It would take some years to put together a complete, exhaustive list; we have not had that much time. Hence this is NOT meant to be an exhaustive list.

However, in the year 2010, the 100 years of celebrating International Women's Day, we surely could not doubt that a group or groups of women could have, by that date, undertaken a successful search for the brief history of many more women and have created an even more noteworthy list than this one. This list should not be seen as final, but as a beginning, in order that future generations may add their own and even earlier women's names to the litany of women's achievements in our State and community.

We have tried to treat each woman's name with equal honour; no exclusions, no preferential treatment; some have sent long descriptions, some almost too brief. After much discussion, we decided on the old printers' dictum: "Follow the copy, even if it flies out of the window". How could we edit what others have sent to us?

A few have complained that there are NO MEN'S NAMES involved, as equal partners in their lives. We have begged the men to amass such a list. Indigenous men may be doing this, and we earnestly hope this proceeds successfully. Our list is here, now,
